
Advice from the Top Twenty Presenters


From the June, 2013 Teaching Professor Conference

We asked the top twenty presenters from our June, 2013 *Teaching Professor* Conference to give future presenters advice. Here are their answers to our questions:


1. Did you create Power Point slides for this presentation?




2. Did you create supplemental materials for your presentation?

- 5. We would like to create some resources for future presenters. Which of the following do you think would be most useful? (Note: here are the top five, starting with highest:
 - Information about strategies for giving presentations to adult learners.

 - Guidelines on active learning strategies.
 - A brief video that offers advice on doing live presentations.
 - A brief video that offers advice on Power Point slides.

- 6. What advice would you give to future presenters?
 - Don't try to "cover" too much. Instead, design the session to engage participants in purposeful work.
 - As much as possible, build the session around the learning activities and group discussion. Presenter and participants should learn from each other.
 - The audience is more interested in finding out something useful, than they are in hearing about what you do.
 - Go beyond teaching tips. Provide data for the things you say work.
 - Double-check that your session objectives are met in your presentation.
 - Be passionate and energetic.
 - If a question is posed from the audience, repeat it so all can hear.
 - Be sure to use activities that engage participants.
 - Try to use a variety of strategies to engage participants in learning. They want to share their experiences and hear from others.
 - Look for a balance between giving information and providing activities.
 - Practice your presentation!
 - Make sure your slides are readable. Don't use a small font size.
 - Do not just read from your slides.
 - Make your presentation inquiry driven.
 - Involve the audience whenever it makes sense to do so.
 - Keep the background and expertise of your audience in mind. Make it meaningful, and involve them.
